7. Explanation of the Change:

The PhD in Health Sciences program has been in existence 2016, and the majority of these changes are based on feedback from graduate student surveys and faculty. Now that multiple students have been through the program, it has allowed for a more reflective review of the plan of study to meet student needs.

The individual threads of teaching and leadership and healthcare issues are looking to change from 12-15 credits to 9-15 credits per thread and research is changing from 15-21 to 15-27 credits, so the

total credit requirement stays at 75. This is based upon student feedback from graduated students and deliberation of steering committee for the program. By increasing the variability in each individual thread, it allows students to tailor their plan of study more specifically to their academic needs within the program to meet current and future job/employment duties. The majority of our students come from one of two typical employment backgrounds: health science clinicians wanting to get into or currently transitioned into academia or they come from public health agencies or a private or public hospital. Those coming from academic profile typically have wanted more of the courses in the teaching thread along with research courses to enhance their research agenda and current/future employment, but the leadership and healthcare issues less so. Those from the healthcare agencies find the reverse with more value in the leadership and healthcare issues and less in teaching. Many students in both backgrounds like the options to take more research classes if able. By creating more flexibility in these threads, it opens the opportunity for students to target their plan of study more directly to their individual needs.

The movement to 3 required courses in the leadership and healthcare issues thread is to make sure all students have the same breadth and depth in this thread with requiring the same courses. This will also lead to improvements in our comprehensive exam process, with ensuring all students have the same level of knowledge with the same required coursework.

The changes to the AHED courses in the teaching thread came through discussion with the program coordinator of the Adult & Higher Education program and Chair of the Educational Administration program within Arts and Sciences on which courses were most suitable for our PhD students.

The HSC 760 class is the previous OCTH 760 Leadership class, which is changing prefixes due to the OT Department putting their transitional OT program that this program to inactive status. This class was a part of their on-line transitional OT program that is currently inactive, the class is not a part of the on-campus OT program. It has been a valuable course for our PhD students with high enrollment, and thus the transition into an HSC prefix to allow it to continue under the PhD in Health Sciences program. This change was done in conjunction and approval of the OT Department Chair, Dr. Nissen.

The clean-up of some courses in the Leadership and Healthcare Issues thread is to delete courses that are no longer offered, only offered in person, and addition of other courses from other programs that are relevant to this thread.

OCTH 783 credit hour change was made to match the course changes done by the OT department that had not yet been reflected in our program of study.

OCTH 770 is primarily geared to entry-level OT students at this point. Limited enrollment from the PhD students did not make it feasible to continue at a 3-credit offering. It is now a 2 credit offering only, so not appropriate for the PhD students.

OCTH 783 is no longer offered, so it will be removed as an option in the POS.

OCTH 733 is only offered in-person now and does not have an on-line component after this year to meet the needs of the on-line PhD in Health Science program.

PUBH 711 is a new course offering from PUBH that will complement well for students in the PhD in Health Sciences program to advance their statistical skills to prep them for dissertation. Thus, it was added to the program of study as an elective.

HSC 898 Credit hours were changed from 3-9 to 1-9 to allow for better flexibility and matching of the actual work students may be doing on their dissertation any given semester. Because many students are working their 40+ week job, increased flexibility in credit offering is beneficial. Dissertation credits taken each semester can more directly reflect the workload with the spreading out of the variable credit limit.

The addition of another HSC 890 course and making it variable credit (1-3) is to allow for moving course work previously done under the HSC 898 for dissertation proposal prep work. By moving it out of the dissertation phase it helps free up scheduling for students within their plan of study to take the class and not be bound to having to pass the comprehensive exam first. In addition, course workload will be better able to match instructors time commitment to Dissertation and the proposal prep course work.

7. Explanation of the Change:

Over 70% of the sport management majors at the University of South Dakota have expressed an interest in a career in college athletics. This course will provide the SPMT majors with an understanding of how the field of intercollegiate athletics operates, while educating them on the responsibilities of the various roles in the industry. This will be beneficial in giving students an opportunity to learn more about the different areas in the industry that may interest them.

These changes provide more options and flexibility for students with diverse interest areas within the Exercise Science specialization. Internship has been moved to an optional course, but Field Experience is required. This still provides a required practical experience but allows the students more flexibility within the program. Making the proposed changes will also prepare the program to seek approval to apply for accreditation through the Council on Accreditation for Strength and Conditioning Education (CASCE). The changes included in this modification align with CASCE standards.

In the Sport Management specialization, removing the 3 credit KSM, HLTH, or PE elective requirement is a correction.

7. Explanation of the Change:

The change from Operational Analytics (OPAN) to Business Analytics (BUSA) expands students' analytics options. The new choices enable students interested in accounting, economics, finance, marketing or operations to pursue a degree that couples the knowledge of a functional unit with the business analytics skills needed to optimize activities in those units. Employers are requesting students with the skills in business analytics and the content knowledge of the other areas of business. Not all analytics professionals will be managing operations activities. There is demand for analysts with knowledge of accounting, finance, marketing, or economics. Operational analytics is still an option, but the curriculum now offers more breadth of coverage. Employers seek graduates with the abilities that come from the studies we propose to offer.






7. Explanation of the Change:

The change from Master of Professional Accountancy (MPA) to Master of Accountancy (MAcc) eliminates confusion surrounding the common acronym shared with the Master of Public Administration (MPA). The name we use for the program (MPA) is not the industry standard and its acronym is ambiguous due to the namespace conflict with the Master of Public Administration. The Google charts demonstrate that fact. Potential students search for "MAcc" not "MPA." The needless obfuscation of the name means that prospects searching for a master's degree in accounting will not find the Beacom School of Business, which means that our program will miss opportunities to serve the needs of those students. This name change has the strong support of our Accounting Advisory Council, consisting of 10 alums who are practicing accountants.
